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

## CA Note from Rev. CAmie



Fellow journeyers on this lifelong faith journey,

It is not a surprise to hear that we live in anxious times. Grappling with concerns about our well-being and the security of our livelihoods. Fear and the urge to prioritize self-preservation dominate the conversation. Yet, the Kin-dom of God calls us to a broader definition of "our own." Jesus commands us to care for all in need, especially the most vulnerable.

The Gospel readings following Epiphany highlight Jesus' radical vision of an economy where wealth is shared for the common good. This message goes beyond the church calendar and remains relevant today. Jesus' mission was clear: to bring good news to the poor. Who will stand with the vulnerable? This has been the Church's core mission from the beginning.

Over the next few weeks, we will journey together to explore the economy of Jesus, guided by the Worship Design Studio's "Six Stone Jars" series. # Message from OUR CHURCH Moderator

This will be my last Circuit Rider message to you as Moderator of the First Congregational Church of Lebanon. In the December Circuit Rider, it was brought to our attention the goals set forth by the church for the new oncoming pastor and the Congregation. I'd like to take this time to give my opinion on how we got here and how we should proceed.

We, the church, voted, and accepted, the idea of hiring a Fulltime-Designated-Term Paster to serve a term of 4 years. In this position that person would agree to work with the congregation to satisfy the given goals. These goals were drawn up by a sub-committee, brought to the church membership to vote on at a Special Meeting. The church body approved these goals and agreed to work with the new pastor to meet these goals. Rev. Amie agreed to these terms with the understanding that the congregation will do their part.

The goals are essentially to grow the church in membership, financially, and outreach to the community. With the status of churches, in general, throughout all denominations, are these goals obtainable? Yes, if we look at them from a realistic point of view. When these goals were written we were in a very optimistic position that made it seem that there are large groups of families in the Lebanon area that are looking for a church such as ours. A realistic look at the data, provided through outside sources, says that this is not necessarily true. But they should still be goals to strive for.

If we are to grow "Our Church", all of us need to do the work. This is not a sub-committee formed out of Church Council working with the Pastor. It is everyone pitching in, in some capacity. We have very active individuals on boards and committees that work very hard to keep the church going, but this is not the same type of work that we need to satisfy the goals.

My personal opinion is to allow Rev. Amie, through her first 4 months, to evaluate our church to see who we are, look at how she fits in, and then we as a church should re-evaluate our goals to determine what is realistic in today's society.

With that said, as I stand at the podium on Sunday morning, I can see more and more parishioners returning to the pews. I believe this is a starting point. Can we reach out and bring in more present members and new members? Is this an outcome because of our new Pastor?

In essence we are a Traditional church. The question is:

Do we need to move into the 21st century and make changes to attract others, or do we need to stay the course (traditional), but allow changes in other areas that make us more appealing in today's world?
